



- FY19: 7 projects, \$122.86M (NDAA +85M; 4 projects)
- FY20: 3 projects, \$84.5M (NDAA +\$25M; 2 projects)
- FY 21: 2 projects, \$39.2M (100% Awarded in year of Approp)


FSRM program execution

Infrastructure Investment Strategy (I2S)

I2S will guide facilities sustainment, restoration, modernization and recapitalization requirements and investment in a way that restores readiness to our power projection platforms, cost effectively modernizes our infrastructure, and drives innovation in installation management practices



3 Lines of Effort

- Restore Readiness to 52% complete Power Projection Platforms
- Cost Effective Modernization of Infrastructure 68% complete
- Drive Innovation in Installation
 Management
 55% complete

Key Elements

- Data-driven asset management
- Optimize investment, no longer worst first
- 5% square footage reduction
- Budget Floor = 2% of Plant Replacement Value (PRV), Target = 2.3% PRV

End State: Adaptive, resilient, right-sized and fiscally sustainable infrastructure to assure combat readiness, lethality, and Airmen resilience

Monitoring Efforts: SAF, HAF, and MAJCOMS are integral to implementation. Implementation progress/effects actively monitored through the Installation Executive Council and A4C governance

SecAF directs SAF/IE to Prepare Air Force Infrastructure Investment Strategy during CORONA Top

SecAF, CSAF, and MAJCOM/CCs signed the final I2S document

Final I2S Implementation Plan enacted

Initial Achievements

- Revised strategic basing policy
- Energy Installation Plans for resiliency initiated at 20 installations
- Postured 5-year integrated project list
- Incentivized divesture of failing facilities and increase in "sweet spot" spending

Accelerate Change for Infrastructure Fall CORONA 2021

- Risk-based hangar fire suppression systems
- Footprint growth offsets
- New facility standards for telework
- Revisit facility options at 150% increase in MILCON/FSRM project
- Basing actions and requirements control




Sundown Policy For Foam Fire Suppression System (FSS)

- SAF/IE signed Sundown Policy for Foam FSS on 16 Nov 21
- Tier 1: Approval thru MAJCOM/A3, AF/A3, to SAF/IE by 16 Feb 22
 - -- "Foam FSS limited where the total loss of the facility, or loss of the aircraft/assets service inside, would result in mission failure at the Department of Defense, Department of the Air Force, Combatant Command or Sub-Unified Command level."
- Tier 2: All others
 - -- "The end-state Tier 2 facility FSS is an automatic water sprinkler system designed to provide life safety protection for occupants to evacuate the facility
- Congressionally mandated phase out of AFFF by Oct 24
- Existing HEF/LEFS approved until replaced with sprinkler sys
- Program projects for HEFS/LEFS replacement by Jul 22
- New facilities
 - Tier 1: Request for approval prior to authorizing design funds
 - Tier 2: Shall be designed with an automatic sprinkler system







MILCON Projects Under Construction



Environmental Programs PFOS/PFOA

- Drinking water at all AFRC installations tested and meets EPA health advisory standards
- Ground water Site Investigations found localized contamination at all AFRC installations
- Remedial Investigation efforts in progress
- Disposal of PFOS/PFOA containing material (i.e. soil, water, etc.) is a concern
 - Method
 - Cost
 - AF guidance required
- AF centrally manages PFOS/PFOA at AFCEC (https://www.afcec.af.mil/WhatWeDo/Environment/Perfluorinated-Compounds)



Environmental ProgramsClimate Planning Activity

- DAF Climate Plan expected by 1 Jan 2022
- AFRC incorporating climate assessments
 - Phase 1 & 2 Climate Hazard & Risk Assessments done for Major AFRC Bases (5)...working 4 AFRC Stations
 - Participating in HAF climate working groups
- Opportunities transitioning into action
 - Office of Local Defense Communities Cooperation (OLDCC) alternative for "climate" plans
 - Need to have Proactive projects for FSRM funds
- 7 of 9 AFRC Local Communities have an "Established Relationship" with OLDCC
